Ft. Campbell Complete

J&S Construction has completed construction of the \$13 million SOF Equipment Maintenance and Supply Complex for the U.S. Corps of Engineers. Located in Fort Campbell, Ky., this complex consists of six new buildings as well as additions to two existing structures, which total over 49,000 square feet of construction. This project included:

- Two Tactical Equipment and Maintenance Facilities (12,433 sf each)
- Two Deployment Equipment Storage Buildings (7,250 sf each)
- Two Petroleum, Oils and Lubricants Storage Rooms (540 sf each)
- One SCUBA Building Addition (6,267 sf)
- One HALO Chute Ops and HALO Pack Area Addition (3,336 sf)

The two Tactical Equipment and Maintenance Facilities will be LEED Gold Certified with energy-efficient design including Variable Refrigerant Flow mechanical systems, polyurethane spray foam insulation at all perimeter walls, low flow water closets and urinals, motion/occupancy sensors on all light fixtures, and high efficiency light fixtures. Energy savings for the new facility are expected to be in excess of \$19,000 annually, giving the Corps a five-year payback.

These buildings will be the first LEED Gold certified buildings at Ft. Campbell. This LEED Gold Certified project will join three other LEED projects J&S has completed. J&S Construction is the first contractor in the state of Tennessee to complete LEED Silver, LEED Gold and LEED Platinum buildings, and J&S Construction owns and operates over 80,000 square feet of LEED Certified buildings.

Fresh start for Madisonville

J&S is proud to announce being awarded the construction contract for the Madisonville First United Methodist Church, located in Madisonville, Tenn.

In December 2007, a fire completely destroyed the FUMC's sanctuary. Working alongside Mark Rodgers, Architect, and the FUMC Building Committee, J&S used the design-build approach to construction to design a new 14,000 square-foot sanctuary and a classroom and administrative addition, both to the existing building.

The sanctuary will seat over 250 people and has also been designed to include a large gathering area where fellowship can be held both before and after services. The administrative and classroom wing will include offices and six classrooms, as well as a space for large youth gatherings.

"We are blessed to have the opportunity to help the Madisonville First United Methodist Church rebuild their sanctuary," said Johnny Stites, Chief Executive Officer of J&S. "It is always exciting to have the opportunity to work alongside a church that has over 170 years of history in the community."

The Church held a groundbreaking ceremony to pray over the site on August 29, and the construction will be completed by Easter of next year.

'Green' up your Building

Did you know that recycling paper products reduces air pollutants by 75 percent and water pollutants by 67 percent? A ton of recycled paper saves the lives of 17 trees and three cubic yards of landfill space. Recycling aluminum saves 95 percent of the energy used to produce aluminum from raw materials.

Buying recycled products is an essential part of closing the loop on the recycling process. As builders, we can play a major role in helping to reduce waste and promote recycling by encouraging our customers to ask for recycled products.

As you consider your next renovation or new construction product, you may want to consider using recycled materials in as many areas as possible. Using recycled materials does not provide the quick return on investment that is generated by other energy saving features, but it does provide high value by limiting the adverse effects on our environment. By using recycled materials, the demand for raw materials is reduced. This reduction helps to minimize materials discarded from construction and business operations, helping to maximize landfills and protect the environment by removing harmful substances from the waste stream.



Green Flooring

Look for environmentally friendly floor coverings. Carpet, linoleum, vinyl composition title and even hardwoods can be environmentally friendly options. Carpet tiles are a great choice because they are manufactured from 50 percent post-consumer waste from recycled tires. The cost is approximately two percent more than conventional carpet; however, when you include the ability to lay carpet in exact quantities and eliminate carpet waste from 12-foot-wide rolls, tiles are less expensive than standard rolls for many applications. Using carpet tiles also allows for easy replacement of areas that become soiled or damaged with use, rather than replacing an entire room.



Another environmentally friendly flooring option is ionized polymeric flooring. IPF is made from recycled materials and uses naturally occurring ionized minerals. These negatively charged ions attract positively charged airborne antiagents to the ground. In layman's terms, the flooring reduces the number of germs, odors, volatile organic compounds (VOC) and other contaminates floating in the air. Contaminates are pulled to the ground by negative ions and are removed from the room through normal floor cleaning and maintenance.

Green Countertops

Recycled glass and concrete countertops are another renewable resource available for your next building project. The countertops can be LEED certified, highly durable and VOC-free. Recycled countertops are produced in about 30 different colors and many have a Cradle-to-Cradle Gold Certification from the U.S. Green Building Council. Being environmentally safe, the composite materials are non-toxic and non-harmful, and there is minimal use of water and energy in production. They are manufactured from recycled materials and can be recycled at the end of their productive life. The companies manufacturing these products are using renewable energy and practicing environmental responsibility.



Going the extra mile... AND THEN SOME.



Going the extra mile is simply doing more than you are asked or expected to do. You may have tried this approach before and became discouraged or found it a waste of your time. The use of the word "ultimately" means these benefits are not obvious and not immediately recognizable, however, they do have a very positive effect on your success in life.

- Going the extra mile will bring out positive emotions in others allowing them to both remember you and feel good about you
- Going the extra mile will help you to move ahead of your competition and succeed where others fail

When we do more than what is required and better than what is expected, it shows that we operate according to a different value system that comes from a higher authority -- an authority whose love and mercy compels us to show the same toward others through sacrificial, Christ-honoring service that goes the extra mile. In this way we help to relay our King's message which, interestingly enough, is in keeping with the original idea behind the service.
